## St. Maries Saddle Club Royalty Guidelines and Expectations

As royalty, you are representing SMSC at all times. Royalty should always conduct themselves professionally and as positive role models as they will be looked upon as such by members of the community for the entire year they serve.

Royalty should have a strong commitment and dedication to SMSC. Club royalty is expected to exhibit high moral standards at all times; present a pleasant personality; look their best; and arrive on time.

Royalty should have their own horse (owned or leased). Horse must be able to lope around entire arena in a controlled and safe manner and be safe to take into a parade.

Royalty and their horse should be neat and well-groomed at events and follow dress code outlined by SMSC.

Royalty must be able to handle their horse with proper horsemanship.

Royalty must attend all required events in order to promote SMSC. At least one member of royalty should be at each SMSC meeting to provide a royalty report. Royalty needs to be present at SMSC horse shows and O-Mok-Sees and assist during these times the duties assigned to them. Royalty should participate in fundraising for the club and be present at the local Labor Day parade. Royalty members need to be available for media coverage and other activities assigned to them.

Royalty is also asked to participate at spring round up for the state.

Royalty shall not serve as royalty for other similar organizations during their reign. Exceptions must be voted on by the board.

Members of royalty must be enrolled in school, a graduate and hold or be working toward a GED.

To be eligible for queen or king title, you must be between the ages of 13 and 19 as of Jan. 1 current year. For senior princess, junior princess and prince titles, you must be between the ages of 8 and 15 as of Jan. 1 the current year.
